As we take a moment to reflect on the remarkable journey of Conservation Florida, I'm filled with admiration for the vision and dedication that has propelled this organization from its humble beginnings to its current role as Florida's premier, boots-on-the-ground land conservancy. It's hard to believe that it all began nearly 25 years ago.

David Carr, son of conservationists Archie and Marjorie Harris Carr, along with his wife Peggy, a scientist whose research created the Florida Wildlife Corridor and established the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Office of Greenways and Trails, planted the seeds of Conservation Florida in Micanopy, Florida – a place so many of our state's pioneers like Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings drew inspiration from. Carr's vision was simple yet profound: protect the wild places that define our state's unique beauty, biodiversity, and ecological integrity. Little did he know that nearly 25 years later, Conservation Florida would grow into a statewide land conservancy protecting wild and working lands from the Florida Panhandle to the Florida Keys.

The early iterations of the Florida Wildlife Corridor maps bear our original name: Conservation Trust of Florida. We're proud to see the impressive progress in the years since its creation.

Today, with our name changed to Conservation Florida, it fills my heart with pride that we've also blossomed into a powerhouse of conservation advocacy. Our voice propelled the passage of conservation policy, including the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act, and powered historic funding for land conservation. We've protected nearly 40,000 acres, with more than 100,000 more acres in the works. We launched a groundbreaking docuseries, "Protect Our

Paradise: Presented by Conservation Florida," and now our work and efforts are being shared nationwide through the power of visual storytelling.

The resolve of our community, volunteers, and partners have proven that when protecting both Florida panthers and black bears, or the emerald waters of Florida's springs, the possibilities are endless.

I encourage each one of you to find that piece of inspiration in these pages. As you peruse the pages of *WildPost*, take a moment to reflect on the stunning landscapes, natural wonders, wild and working lands, and wildlife species that <u>you've</u> helped protect. 
groups, governments, and residents, to preserve culturally, historically, and ecologically significant places across Florida.





Conserving Ranches Means Protecting Wild Florida I t's hard work and heart work, but it's glorious all the same – we're talking about Florida cattle ranching. The job is thankless in many ways, but many don't know that ranches in Florida are some of the last, vast wildlands in the state. Or that without protecting ranchlands, the Florida Wildlife Corridor will never be conserved. Simply put, cows are keeping Florida green.

Land values have been on the rise for years as residents migrate south to the Sunshine State. In 1960, fewer than 5 million called Florida **home**. That number jumped to 23 million – and it's still rising. **A population the size of Orlando moves to the state each year.**



But it's ranches, not rooftops, that are contributing to the long-term health of our state's wildlife and residents. They're also keeping places that would become cookie-cutter, concrete, single-family homes from meeting that fate – for now. Ranches indeed provide a rich service to our future.

Florida ranchlands provide critical habitats for our native species, and from the swamps to the sandhills, they are key to supporting our unique biodiversity. Many ranchlands preserve landscapes in their natural and untouched conditions, keeping lands wild and harboring pockets of Old Florida.

In 2021, Florida lawmakers passed the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act, which outlined the importance of protecting a statewide, functional wildlife corridor. Within that corridor are 3.2 million acres of ranchlands making up about 18% of the existing corridor – and less than 20% of those lands are protected.

Florida is the birthplace of cattle ranching in America. In 1521, on Ponce de León's second trip to the land he named La Florida, the Spanish explorer brought along Andalusian cattle – something never seen in America.



Today, there are about 15,500 operations, encompassing more than 7 million acres of land with some 1,750,000 head of cattle, and more than 5,000 registered brands in Florida. The future of Florida's conservation success depends on the protection of Florida's ranchlands.

So, Conservation Florida has teamed up with the Florida Cattlemen's Association to tell the story and convey the importance of Florida's cattle ranchers as integral to the protection of Florida's Wildlife Corridor, wild Florida, and more.

These ranchers are the keepers of Florida's last frontier, ranchers like Matt Pearce.

"I am a seventh-generation Florida rancher whose family settled along the western shore of Lake Okeechobee, and grazed cattle along the Kissimmee River before there were fence laws," Pearce said. "My great-grandfather traveled to Tallahassee in 1934 and was one of the original founders of the Florida Cattlemen's Association."

Pearce believes that in Florida, land conservation and ranching go hand in hand.

To those outside of the agricultural community, cattle may be question marks in the conservation conversation. But we now know that grazing livestock may just be the most economical and sustainable solution for conserving the declining populations of dependent species – like the critically endangered Florida grasshopper sparrow – and do so much more. Ranches in Florida provide some of the last, vast green spaces in our state and are vital to connecting the Wildlife Corridor.

We're working to bring those ranches into conservation – to keep them working and wild. But time is of the essence. Wild and working lands are wasting away to pavement, complexes, and subdivisions. We need your help!

Wildlife Corridor

Half of Florida – connected to all of us

Conservation Florida is grounded by a deep love for Florida and a history of impactful, boots-on-the-ground land conservation.

Much of our work is focused on one living, breathing geography: the Florida Wildlife Corridor.

After decades of work from conservationists, scientists, politicians, and many others, the Florida Wildlife Corridor Act was signed into law following unanimous bipartisan support by the Florida Legislature in 2021.

The Florida Wildlife Corridor Act – the first major win in Florida land conservation – recognized a network of nearly 18 million acres of connected lands and waters supporting wildlife and people in law. With this win in hand, legislators and the governor have allocated unprecedented funding for land conservation.

So...what's at stake?

The Florida Wildlife Corridor spans roughly **18 million acres** – but nearly **8 million acres** are still left unprotected.

Where is it?

BELLINI PRESERVE, 605 acres

Six hundred and five acres of beautiful Lake Marion waterfront property, which was once on the verge of being bulldozed for more than 450 multifamily units, is now safe and sound forever.

Joined with six dedicated conservation partners, including conservation buyer Arnie Bellini, Polk County Natural Lands, and the Department of Defense, we fought to conserve this key piece of the Florida Wildlife Corridor.

The property – one of the last pieces of unprotected Florida scrub in Polk County and a critical linkage in the Florida Wildlife Corridor – sits right on the water's edge of Lake Marion and boasts three-and-a-half miles of shoreline, which means significant water impacts for the Northern Everglades if it were to be lost to development.

The incredible property is now an environmental park for public use and recreation – forever protected.

ARBUCKLE CREEK RANCH, 1,250 acres

This Highlands County property is a major connector piece in the Florida Wildlife Corridor. We knew it *had* to be protected. More, it's adjacent to the Avon Park Air Force Range and its protection supports our military readiness.

At a time when Florida is facing intense development pressures, ranchlands are sought after for conversion into large housing developments and planned communities. Conservation Florida has made ranchlands in the Northern Everglades a top protection priority within its Headwaters to Okeechobee regional land and water conservation initiative.

Arbuckle Creek Ranch is a family-run, cow-calf operation. It is also home to an endangered cutthroat grass community – a species limited to just five Florida counties. Florida panthers have also been documented on this wild ranch. Thanks to you, and our partners at the USDA NRCS and the Department of Defense, this property is now permanently protected.



GISSY RAINBOW RIVER RANCH, 135 acres

This landmark conservation acquisition ensures that the largest last, undeveloped piece of land along the Rainbow River stays this way - forever.

This property does it all; protects water, wildlife, and scenic views along the river, and serves as a critical connecting piece of the Florida Wildlife Corridor.

We are so proud to have worked with Mr. Gissy and the Department of Environmental Protection to bring this property into conservation.

Rainbow River is one of the largest spring runs in the world and is a designated National Natural Landmark, an aquatic preserve, and an Outstanding Florida Waterway.

Initially, Jim Gissy, landowner of Gissy Rainbow River Ranch, explored the idea of building an eco-friendly resort on his riverfront property. An outpouring of community support and advocacy to keep the beloved land wild and undeveloped inspired Gissy to seek conservation alternatives instead with Conservation Florida.

"We are so pleased to have conserved this special property and the scenic views it provides to those enjoying the Rainbow River," said Gissy. "The property will never be a subdivision or a shopping center. It will always be family land with no more than two more private homes and barns."

While there are acres and acres of wild Florida still left to save, we have plenty of wins worth celebrating. Here at Conservation Florida, 2023 was a big year for us!

ROLE TRAN, 2,526 acres

Located in the Northern Everglades, the 2,526-acre Role Tran property is not only a working cattle ranch, but it is also adding to the Florida Wildlife Corridor.

Thanks to a partnership between Conservation Florida, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and the U.S. Department of Defense, it is also now forever conserved.

"Our family is proud to contribute to the conservation of Florida's wild and working agricultural lands, and the Florida Wildlife Corridor," said Lee Lightsey, partner and owner of Role Tran.

Through the permanent protection of Role Tran, a significant dry prairie has also been conserved, which is critical in the long-term protection of the native natural community and the accompanying species that call it home. The protection of this landscape allows for the management of thousands of acres that serve as habitats for at-risk wildlife such as gopher tortoises, which are considered threatened under the Endangered Species Act.

D RANCH PRESERVE, 476 acres

Safeguarded in Osteen, Florida, nestled within a historically rural area, and bordering the Lake Monroe Conservation Area, this once-operational ranch has undergone a remarkable transformation into a wildlife sanctuary.

Within D Ranch Preserve, you'll find a mix of different habitats. These include critical Florida scrub habitat, scrubby flatwoods, mesic flatwoods, and depression marsh.

From the colorful coral snake to the iconic gopher tortoise, and from the adorable Florida mouse to the majestic wood stork and Florida black bear, our preserve is home to a diverse range of plant and animal life.

You might even spot rare and beautiful flowers like the pine lily and sky-blue lupine. While the preserve is not currently open to the public, we do host several public events throughout the year. Our team at Conservation Florida loves welcoming visitors for Wild Walks, Bioblitzes, and other exciting events. Stay tuned for updates on when you can join us to explore the wonders of D Ranch Preserve.

Conservation Florida works as your conservation partner to secure protection for its current portfolio of more than 100,000 acres of wild Florida. **These** three projects, Eagle Haven Ranch, AP Ranch, and Green Glades West, are just a few of the shining examples of remarkable projects that you are supporting – and each of them is on the path to protection!

EAGLE HAVEN RANCH: POLK COUNTY

More than 2,900 acres and 4+ miles of water frontage on Lake Kissimmee, Eagle Haven Ranch is home to 300-year-old oaks, 200 species of birds, and absolute Old Florida beauty. It ties into a network of protected lands that stretch south to Lake Okeechobee. In addition to frontage on Lake Kissimmee, Eagle Haven also borders Lake Wales Ridge State Forest, the Kissimmee Chain of Lakes WMA, and Polk County Park's Coleman Landing. Eagle Haven is truly that - a haven for our country's national symbol. Eleven nesting bald eagle mates call this property home.

AP RANCH: HIGHLANDS COUNTY

Towering longleaf pines, native Florida wiregrass, and a mosaic of habitats supporting Florida's threatened and endangered wildlife like the Florida panther and the Florida gopher tortoise, AP Ranch in Highlands County is a 1,000-acre working cattle ranch that is full of life. The landowner often shares images of Florida black bear cubs playing on the property!

GREEN GLADES WEST: HENDRY COUNTY

When you say Everglades, chances are the image you're conjuring up is everything that is found on the Green Glades West property. Five thousand acres set within the heart of the Florida Everglades, the property is a unique and important piece of the Florida Wildlife Corridor that provides habitat to endangered plants and wildlife. The Florida panther and the Florida black bear are often found on-site. In addition to the wildlife this property supports, protection of pristine parcels like Green Glades West is beneficial for clean drinking water, protection of Florida's communities during hurricanes and floods, and more.


